So...this parrot walks into a bar and says to the bartender...oops...wrong bird, wrong story.

Barb's birthday is near Mother's Day, so we usually celebrate both events by enjoying a meal, with our daughter and son's families at a mutually agreeable time and location. We all share good food, good times, and presents. Since my birthday is almost a month after hers, we are the same age for a few weeks, then Barb returns to being the "younger woman". This year, our daughter's family gave Barb a huge, beautiful, hanging plant arrangement. No worries folks, I'm going to give you the "bird"... story soon. We hung that gorgeous plant on our deck in a special spot where we could see and enjoy it every day. We left for the Beach for a couple days, and when we returned, there was a bird nesting in the plant on four cute little eggs.

How about that...an expectant mother in a Mother's Day plant. Well, after a little research we identified the bird as a chickadee. A couple days later, I was leafing through the new issue of Woodcarving Illustrated and came across an article on how to carve a baby chickadee. Now, I'm not particularly superstitious, or a big believer in coincidences, but I had to ask myself, "is someone trying to tell me It's time to carve a chickadee?" Hmm

Paul Harvey used to say, "... and now for the rest of the story." After further research, and talking to the owner of the Wild Bird Store in Salem, we determined that the nesting "mother" is actually a Dark-eyed Junco. Oh well, as a good friend used to say, "Don't ruin a good story by sticking too close to the truth."

Does this mean I'm "bird brained"? Or that I really don't have to carve a chickadee?

Dark-eved Junco

Sparrow with incredible variation between populations. All have short pink Bills and white outer tail feathers. Often flocks in winter, foraging on



ground for seeds. Visits feeders.
Subspecies include: Slate-colored
(widespread), Oregon (West), Pink sided
(Rockies), Gray-headed (Rockies), Redbacked (New Mexico), and White-winged
(Colorado in Winter).



Black-capped Chicadee

Tiny, plump-bodied, big-headed bird is a familiar woodland resident and backyard visitor in the northern U.S. and Canada. Gray overall with buffy flanks and a contrasting head pattern: black cap, white cheek, and black throat. Short, stubby bill is used for hammering open seeds. Often the core of mixed flocks of songbirds.

Visits feeders. Nearly identical to Carolina Chickadee.

We certainly had a great, May, Club meeting. Seeing Jason Evans and his Students from Falls City High was very special. They demonstrated their progress with several items for Show and Tell. The timing of their visit was perfect, because they were able to jump right in and carve along in Everett Carter's "incisive carved Santa" program. Their enthusiasm, and desire to continue the class next year, convinced me that the Club's decision to support Jason's elective wood carving class was a great investment in the future of the art of woodcarving. I'm certain several of his students will one day reflect on their experience and embrace the art in earnest.
